Hopefully this makes it easier for families not to have to arrange leave or care arrangements for your child on the 18 June too.

LIBRARY BOOKS TO RETURN

We were able to send nearly two thousand library books home with the children before we went into lock down so you would have plenty of reading material for them and we are now really keen to get the books back as soon as we can so the library will be well stocked with lots for the children to choose from. A huge amount of books were returned over the last two weeks, which was fabulous, but we still have about 150 needing to come back.

Could families please have a look for them at home. Reminder notices were sent home two weeks ago so you know which books you are looking for. In the mean time till they come back it will affect the children's ability to have new books issued to them as we are back to our usual limit of 3 books at a time now. The books will be put aside for several days before being re shelved when they are returned. The Library has been open again for the past two weeks with a few new protocols to keep everyone safe and it has been great to be back in the library again.

POTENTIAL WINTER WEATHER IMPACTING ON SCHOOL START TIMES

Well I guess now that we are in the winter term it is timely to remind families what might happen if the weather turns particularly nasty and snow or ice make the roads so dangerous that schools around the city need to be delayed till 10am or possibly be closed for the day.

In the event of very dangerous road conditions due to snow or black ice etc a blanket decision is made for the whole of Dunedin by Principals who live in the hill suburbs, after consulting Police etc. This includes Macandrew Bay School.

A decision is made on either a late start at 10.00am or to close Dunedin Schools for the day. It is very important that families listen to the radio if weather conditions are bad in town and particularly listen to the cancellation notices on local radio stations. It is usually on after the

7.30am news and again at 8.00am. The reason these decisions are made is that even if children can get to school the staff often live some distance from the school and up on the hills and we can't guarantee that we can staff the school even if the children can make it.

if you are in doubt please look up the School's website as we always try to post late starts or school closures on our Homepage: http://macbayschool.edublogs.org or just google Macandrew Bay School. Keep on looking as we can only do that once we have heard the city wide decision. It is great if you hear school is off that you let your friends and neighbours know too if their children also attend our school. We will also attempt to send all families a text message once we know that this is happening so check your messages too if the weather is really bad.



Violin Lessons (For children ages 3 - 13)

Suzuki violin lessons are now available at Broad Bay.

The Suzuki Method is an internationally known music curriculum and teaching philosophy created by Japanese violinist and pedagogue Shinichi Suzuki. Suzuki music education combines instrumental teaching with a philosophy embracing the total development of the child. The triangle of a parent, teacher, and child creates a community of learning and sharing, nurturing happy and successful future world citizens through music.

Dr Suzuki believed that musical ability is not an inborn talent but a capacity which can be nurtured and developed. Any child who experiences the right environment can acquire musical ability and grow into a sensitive, disciplined, and confident person. "Teaching music is not my main purpose. I want to make good citizens, noble human beings" (Dr Suzuki).

Individual half-hour lessons are \$30, which will be billed in bulk for the term. Lessons will take place after school in the choir room. Violins can be provided for those who can't afford one. Parents are encouraged to attend the lessons and contribute to learning and practice at home, which will enhance your child's learning.

Parenting Through Transitions

Developing strategies to help manage change

IN BRIEF

Parenting Through Transitions (PTT) is a course designed for parents and caregivers who have recently experienced significant change in their lives.

Whether redundancy, a change in family life (such as the impact of the COVID-19 lockdown) or experiencing a new and unexpected situation, it is important for parents to figure out how to manage the repercussions that occurand how they may effect the well-being of their children.

THE COURSE

Parenting Through Transitions is a weekly course - delivered in four 90 min sessions - designed to provide both skills and understanding about how to manage challenges associated with the transitions occurring in their lives.

The course is limited to a capacity of 10 participants, but will be running back-to-back throughout the year, so waitlists will be short.

Our standard course fee of \$75pp or \$110 per couple applies. However, please ask about our community support options if this is is a barrier.

WHAT YOU CAN EXPECT

PTT will provide the opportunity for participants to gain skills in managing the challenges of their current situation

Resources will be available that will allow parents and their children to make positive changes in their relationships

Participants will be part of a small group of people experiencing similar challenges
